SUBJECT: Rescission of the Coat of Arms and Distinctive Insignia for the
313th Regiment Cavalry, Organized Reserves

1. The coat of arms for the 313th Regiment Cavalry, Organized Reserves, rescinded this date, was

a. Originally approved for the 313th Regiment Cavalry, Organized Reserves, by letter AG 424.5 Coats of Arms (1-11-25)Misc., the Office of The Adjutant General, 12 October 1925;

b. Amended by letter AG 424.5 Coats of Arms (3-23-27)(Misc.), the Office of The Adjutant General, 6 April 1927.

2. The distinctive insignia approved for the 313th Regiment Cavalry, Organized Reserves, by letter AG 421.7 313th Cavalry (7-25-27)(Misc.), the Office of The Adjutant General, 5 August 1927, is rescinded this date.

3. This rescission is in accordance with letter AG 322 (15 Oct 43) OB-I-GNGCT-M dated 18 October 1943, data of which was verified by the Office of The Adjutant General 13 September 1957. The 313th Cavalry Regiment, Organized Reserves was disbanded in 1943.

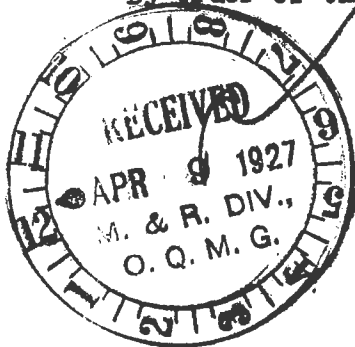
To: The Quartermaster General.

SHIELD: Per fess gules and or, a mullet counterchanged of the field, within a bordure similarly divided of the second and vert.

2. The remainder of the approval of October 12th is unchanged.

SUBJECT: Coat of Arms for the 313th Regiment
Cavalry, Organized Reserves.

To: The Quartermaster General.

1. The following coat of arms for the 313th Regiment Cavalry, Organized Reserves, is approved:

SHIELD: Per fess gules and or, a mullet counterchanged, within a bordure compony vert and of the second (or).

CREST: That for the regiments of the Organized Reserve. On a wreath of the colors (or and gules) the Lexington Minute Man proper. Note Quartermaster General drawing CE 5-8-1. The statue of the Minute Man, Captain John Parker, H. H. Kitson, sculptor, stands on the Common in Lexington, Mass.

MOTTO: We Also Serve.

DESCRIPTION: The 313th Cavalry was originally organized at Del Rio, Texas, on March 28, 1916. It was broken up on August 23, 1918 to form the 69th and 70th Field Artillery Regiments and the 26th Trench Mortar Battery. These latter units were disbanded in December, 1918 and February, 1919, at Camp Knox, Ky.

Under authority of Section 3A, National Defense Act, as amended, the 69th and 70th Regiments of Field Artillery and the 26th Trench Mortar Battery (formerly 313th Cavalry) disbanded at Camp Knox, Kentucky, in December, 1918, and February, 1919, were reconstituted and consolidated with the 313th Cavalry, Organized Reserves, on March 19, 1925.

After the formation of the above named units in August, 1918 they moved from station at Del Rio, Texas to Camp Knox, Ky., where they remained in training until demobilized in December, 1918 and February, 1919.

The present 313th Cavalry was constituted in the Organized Reserves in January, 1922 as a unit of the 64th Cavalry Division, with headquarters in Earlington, Ky.

The colors of the shield indicate the history of the regiment as Cavalry, Artillery and again Cavalry. The Lone Star suggests the State in which

SUBJECT: Distinctive Insignia, 313th Regiment Cavalry, Organized Reserves.

To: The Quartermaster General.

1. The following distinctive insignia for the 313th Regiment Cavalry, Organized Reserves, under paragraph 48, Army Regulation 600-40, is approved:

SHIELD: Per fess gules and or, a mallet counterchanged of the field, within a bordure similarly divided of the second and vert.

MOTTO: We Also Serve.

The insignia is the shield and motto of the coat of arms of the 313th Cavalry. It will be manufactured in bright metal and enamel in one size, as the organization may select, but not in excess of 1-1/4 inches in height.

TO BE WORN:

By officers: On the service uniform on the upper portion of the shoulder loops of coat; on the front of the service hat midway between band and crease.

On olive drab shirt on the upper portion of the shoulder loops.

On white uniform same as on service coat.

On mess jacket on both lapels above line of miniature medals.

By enlisted personnel: On the service uniform on both sides of the collar; on standing collar, 3/4 of an inch in rear of the service insignia; on roll collar, centered on collar, lower edge 1/2 of an inch from upper edge of button insignia; on the front of the service hat midway between band and crease.

2. The inclosed finished sample, submitted by the organization, of distinctive insignia for the 313th Regiment Cavalry, Organized Reserve, is approved for wear under Army Regulation 600-40, paragraph 48.
